ARREST MADE IN GOYA THEFT CASE

(Toledo, Ohio–October 24, 2007) The Toledo Museum of Art learned today that an arrest has been made in the case of the 2006 theft of the Museum’s Francisco de Goya y Lucientes painting, *Children with a Cart* (1778). “Our number one concern in this matter was the safe return of the painting, which has been on view in Gallery 28A since its return,” said Dr. Don Bacigalupi, TMA Director. “It is satisfying to learn that an arrest has been made, and we commend the FBI and the U.S. Attorney’s office for their diligent investigation.”

After having been stolen in November 2006, the painting was recovered by the FBI and returned unharmed in early January 2007 to the Toledo Museum of Art, where it is part of the permanent collection.

When stolen, the painting was en route from Toledo to the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum in New York City, where it was scheduled to be included in the exhibition *Spanish Painting from El Greco to Picasso: Time, Truth, and History*. After its recovery, the painting joined the Guggenheim exhibition through its closing date and was subsequently reinstalled in Toledo.
