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THREE INDICTED FOR GUN CRIMES PROJECT SAFE NEIGHBORHOODS CREDITED

(Tyler, Texas) A federal grand jury in Tyler has returned three separate indictments today for federal firearms violations in the Eastern District of Texas.

TREVATHAN JABAR GLEEN, age 32, from Lufkin, has been indicted for Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Possession with Intent to Distribute a Controlled Substance and Possession of a Firearm During and in Relation to a Drug Trafficking Crime. Gleen was indicted after Lufkin Police purchased more than 50 grams of crack cocaine from him during a four month undercover investigation earlier this year. During one of the transactions Gleen allegedly possessed a 9mm rifle. In July 1995, Gleen was convicted for Possession of a Controlled substance in Montgomery County, Texas and it is illegal for him to possess a firearm. Gleen could face a maximum sentence of life in prison plus five years to be served consecutively with the underlying offense and a \$4.5 million fine.

EMMITT ANDREWS, 34, of San Augustine, has been indicted on two counts of Felon in Possession of a Firearm. Andrews was indicted after Lufkin Police responded to a trespassing complaint and discovered the defendant possessing two rifles. He has a prior felony conviction for Retaliation in Angelina County in February 1991 and it is illegal for him to possess firearms. Andrews could face a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison and a \$500,000 fine.

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CURTIS RAY DAVIS, age 45, of San Augustine, has been indicted for Felon in Possession of a Firearm. Davis was arrested on March 5, 2004 after officers with the San Augustine Police Department discovered he was carrying a .22 caliber pistol during a visit to the police station. In November 1987, Andrews was convicted of Burglary of a Habitation in San Augustine County and it is illegal for him to possess a firearm. Andrews could face a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

A grand jury indictment is not evidence of guilt. All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law. Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN) is a comprehensive, strategic approach to gun law enforcement. PSN targets gun crime and violent offenders in an effort to make our communities safer.
