Introduction

This product is designed to highlight the Office on Violence Against Women's (OVW) grant program to address children and youth impacted by domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and engaging men and boys in the prevention of violence against women and girls. It is intended to provide a glimpse into the background & focus of the grant program as

well as the work/impact of the grantees. This storybook includes current CYEM grantees (fiscal years 2019 - 2022) and newly funded 2023 CYEM grantees.

The History of the CYEM Grant Program

The 2005 reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) created four distinct children and youth programs. These programs were 1) Grants to Assist Children and Youth Exposed to Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking Program (CEV), 2) Services to Advocate for and Respond to Youth Program (Youth Services), 3) Services, Training, Education and Policies to Reduce Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking in Secondary Schools Grant Program (STEP), and 4) Engaging Men & Boys in Preventing Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking (Engaging Men). Beginning in 2008, OVW began releasing solicitations for one or more of the programs based on annual appropriations.

Over the course of many years, OVW realized the programs were each limited in scope and did not fully represent the work in the field. The programs were reimagined as one comprehensive program that maintained the spirit and intent of the original four programs. Also at this time, the reauthorization of VAWA 2013 consolidated the four programs into one program authorized by the CHOOSE Children & Youth and SMART Prevention statutes which OVW administered as the Children & Youth and Engaging Men (CYEM) program.

OVW has continued to observe, listen to the field, and respond to the challenges of our grantees. Today the CYEM program releases two distinct solicitations – one for CY and one for EM. This allows for greater equity between the programs & allows for grantees to focus on the critical need for response/treatment strategies for children & youth impacted by violence as well as prevention work with men & boys in communities across the country.

Response and Prevention: How Youth-Centered and Engaging Men Work Transforms Individuals, Families, and Communities

The CYEM grantees work tirelessly to engage communities across the country to create safer homes, safer schools, and safer communities for children and youth. Serving young people and engaging boys and men requires a comprehensive, trauma-informed, people-centered approach to prevention, intervention, treatment, and response work that is most impactful when led by a coordinated community response (CCR). In order to be effective, a CCR must

center the voices and lived experiences of young people, their non-abusing caregivers, and boys and men. By creating innovative, intersectional, and multifaceted projects, CYEM grantees are pioneering programs that touch the lives of young people and boys and men in lasting and impactful ways. CYEM grantees are working collaboratively with domestic violence and homeless shelters, rape crisis centers, victim service providers, schools and school districts, fatherhood organizations, faith-based organizations, children advocacy centers, LGBTQ+ centers, head start programs, men's organizations, community-based programs, sports teams, local government agencies and programs, and tribal governments to create opportunities for children and youth that they will carry across their lifetime.

The Cornerstone of the Work: Youth-Centered Coordinated Community Response (CCR)

While most projects are unique and tailored to the diverse communities they are developed in and with, the development of a collaborative CCR is an essential component of every CYEM project. Addressing the complex and diverse needs of children and youth who are victims of and/or exposed to the four VAWA crimes cannot be addressed by one organization or program. Nor can comprehensive engaging men prevention efforts be limited to one organization. In order to have a wide impact and sustainability of programs, it is essential that multiple parts of a community are working together to respond to and prevent the varying levels of violence impacting children and youth. This response work, while similar to CCR's work to support adult survivors of violence, must also include key stakeholders supporting and caring for young people. For example, it is essential to have schools, community-based youth serving organizations, faith-based organizations, afterschool programs, social services, homeless and run-away youth programs, as well as other children and youth programs participating as key partners within the response. In engaging men prevention work, key community stakeholders can include schools, businesses, faith-based institutions, youth sports leagues and teams, fatherhood groups, homeless shelters, public housing, civic groups, re-entry programs, and more. It is through the youth centered CCR that lasting healing & community change can occur.

Project Partners

Project partners are an essential aspect of each CYEM grantee's success. It is together, in meaningful partnership, that each grantee and their partners can impact the safety and

wellbeing of children and youth. To ensure that the voices and experiences of survivors are central to the development and implementation of each project, every grantee is required to have a victim service provider as a project partner, if not the grantee. Additionally, grantees must include partners that have experience that reflects their proposed project as well as those who have expertise engaging and supporting children and youth.

Purpose Areas

To meet the intent of Congress, OVW created specific purpose areas to address the goals laid out in the statutes. Grantees must choose to focus their projects based on these purpose areas.

The purpose areas of the children and youth (CY) solicitation include:

- Services and Training to Address Children Exposed to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, and/or Sex Trafficking (within ages 0-10)
- Creating Safer Communities for Youth: Prevention, Intervention, Treatment, and Response Services for Youth Impacted by Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, and/or Sex Trafficking (within ages 11-24)
- Providing School-Based Services: Prevention, Intervention, and Response to Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, and/or Sex Trafficking (within ages 5-19)

The purpose area of the engaging men and boys (EM) solicitation include:

 Implement education, training, or other programming that enables men and boys to serve as allies in the prevention of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and sex trafficking.

The Heart of the Work: CYEM Grantees

The heart of the CYEM program are the grantees and the young people they serve. Because grantee projects center the lived experiences of young people in their mission, vision, purpose and impact, grantees have created a variety of innovative strategies to serve communities and create lasting change.

Primary project activities or deliverables: Locating a place in either or both of the communities that could create opportunity for local community members to gather and have access to intervention and prevention programming has been a major focus of this project. Our small team was able to connect with a well-regarded, well known and well loved pastor and community member in Cumberland county to secure space and begin to collaborate around the needs of the community while carving out and creating a trauma-informed space for the intervention component of the program. The shared vision of this Pastor and our team is to work with other community members and groups accessing the site to work together in the community to support the needs of families.

Another exciting portion of the project is beginning to take shape and really took root through our connection and collaboration with our primary project partner, TAFCAR. When the Project Director began to explore prevention programming that would fit the needs of very young children from diverse communities, an unusual email sparked an idea and led to a conversation that led the team back to TAFCAR who had been begun to utilize materials from this source for other programming with families being served in another division of the parent agency, It may

sound confusing, but the connection is serendipitous and we feel the prevention encounters we can create in the community will be the right fit for our project.

Each and every project that we have worked on has clearly demonstrated the need to look internally to collaborate and how strengthening the interior of the organization can strengthen the ways that the communities are seen, heard, and served...and that we are ALL part of the community!! This has not been a straight line journey and its been incredibly challenging in countless ways, but we do believe that all of this has allowed for shifting the lens around partnerships and collaborations and has led us toward new opportunities to enhance the way we see our existing CCR and the real potential to expand and enhance this to meet the needs of the counties in ways that make sense for each of the counties. 

 - a. **MOU partners:** Violence Intervention Program, a culturally specific organization, the Free to Be Youth Project at the Urban Justice Center, the Clinic to End Tech Abuse (CETA) at Cornell Tech, and the Major's Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based Violence.

- b. The project aims to: 1) provide tailored community education for different audiences about teen dating violence and technology abuse, 2) provide direct services to youth impacted by technology abuse, 3) distribute information about the project to schools and youth across the city. By working primarily with youth of color and tailoring services/programming to their needs as well as to LGBTQI+ youth, the project addresses OVW priority areas 1 and 3. By providing services to youth impacted by tech abuse and providing education about the role of technology in IPV, the project addresses the program-specific priority against online harm and abuse.
- Domestic Violence Center victims' service provider, will address CY purpose area 2 by serving children and youth aged 13-19 in the service area of Chester County, Pennsylvania.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Planned Parenthood of Southeastern Pennsylvania's LGBTQIA+ Youth Spaces, SPOT, and Rainbow Phoenix.
 - b. The project aims to: 1): focus on outreach, services, prevention, and support for underserved communities targeting LGBTQIA+ and immigrant youth impacted by domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking and sex trafficking; 2): engage in increased outreach to and provide trainings for adult allies in teen dating violence prevention, such as mentors, teachers, parents, youth program coordinators, and within the juvenile justice system; 3): provide educational programming to, crisis counseling and referral services for, and coordinating support group offerings; 4): develop and deliver prevention programming for youth to assist youth in understanding and recognizing abusive behavior and addressing bystander intervention utilizing the program's educational component; and 5): will recruit CCR Team members who are victims/survivors of and/or significant others who have been impacted by domestic/dating violence, members of law enforcement, representatives from the medical community, and youth education administrators. The project addresses OVW priority area 3.
- The Guam Coalition against Sexual Assault and Family Violence, a victim service provider, will implement Prevention, Resources, Outreach, Awareness (PROA) to

address EM purpose areas 1,2, and 3 in targeted villages within the service area of Guam.

- a. **MOU partners:** Guma'Mami Inc., a victim service provider, and Mane'lu, a men and boys focused organization.
- b. The project aims to: 1) enable men and boys to model respect and healthy behaviors/actions as allies in preventing violence against women and girls, 2) enhance prevention, resources, outreach, and awareness projects that incorporate island cultural practices into existing male-focused programs, and 3) facilitate ongoing implementation of the PROA Project through a culturally relevant train-the-trainer model. By providing culturally sensitive training and education to Asian and Pacific Islanders, including immigrant communities from the Federated States of Micronesia, that adapts resources to island cultural practices, the project addresses OVW priority areas 1 and 5.
- The Jeanne Geiger Crisis Center, Inc., victim service provider, will implement the Children and Youth Program to Prevent and Respond to Domestic and Dating Violence to address CY purpose area 3 by serving children and youth aged 14-19 in the service area of Lawrence, MA.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Lawrence School District, a school district, YWCA of Northeastern Massachusetts, and Merrimack Valley Black and Brown Voices.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) Hire and train advocates to provide prevention, intervention, treatment, and resources to school community, 2) review school policies and practices around gender-based violence/accessibility and make recommendations for improvement, 3) provide a variety of prevention programming that includes bystander training; a healthy masculinity program; healthy relationships and dating violence awareness and training; and Girls Inc programming, 4) implement professional development training for school staff to identify and support students impacted by gender-based violence, and 5) provide training to other partners in the system (law enforcement, prosecutors, etc) occurring during summer break.
- Justice Innovation, Inc (d.b.a. Center for Justice Innovation), a community-based organization, will address purpose areas 1, 2, and 3 to recruit men and boys as mentors,

integrate education into existing programs, and develop a train the trainer program to implement the Men Rising Initiative, in the service area of the Bronx and Harlem, NY.

- a. MOU partners: the Violence Intervention Program, Inc. (victim service provider); CONNECT; Getting Out and Staying Out; BronxConnect; New York City Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety; and New York City Mayor's Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based Violence.
- b. The project aims to: Address the intersection of gun violence and intimate partner violence by: 1) Recruiting cohorts of male credible messengers and gun violence prevention staff from gun violence prevention networks for mentorship training; 2) Enabling cohort members to design and implement community norms change campaigns, including messaging, public education materials, and community activations; 3) Implementing three two-month train the trainer programs with men who complete the Men Rising Initiative mentorship training to prepare them to lead similar mentorship programs in their communities. The project addresses OVW priority area 1, racial equity and 2, underserved populations by focusing on communities with populations that are mainly Black, African American, and Latinx with a large Caribbean/West Indian population, Dominican, African, and Puerto Rican.
- The Korean-American Family Service Center, Inc., a victim service provider, will implement Project Men Inspiring and Rising Against Abuse (MIRAA) to address EM purpose areas 1 and 2 in the service area of New York City, with a focus in Queens.
 - a. **MOU partners:** the Chinese-American Planning Council, a men and boys focused organization.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) build and cultivate a network of male leaders and advocates which may include high school youth, young professionals, and first-generation immigrant men in the Korean and Asian American community, 2) effectively engage Asian/Korean men and boys in the community to prevent violence against women through trainings, open discussions, and peer outreach that adapt A Call to Men's LIVERESPECT and PARENTING JOURNEY programs to Korean/Asian cultures, and 3) launch a community-wide campaign against domestic violence and sexual assault through establishing Network of Korean

American Men Against Domestic Violence (NKAMADV), hosting Community Breakfasts, and producing and distributing culturally specific, bilingual Public Service Announcements (PSAs). By creating programs and spaces for Korean and other Asian Americans from immigrant backgrounds and developing and adapting culturally responsive education and training materials for men and boys in these communities, the project addresses OVW priority area 1 and 5.

- Monsoon Asians & Pacific Islanders in Solidarity, which is a culturally specific, community-based and victim service provider, will address purpose area 2, serving youth ages 11 –24 in the service area of Central Iowa.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Evelyn K. Davis Center for Working Families, a community-based organization.
 - b. This project aims to: 1): develop the API Youth Wellness & Safety Program with a goal to expand prevention, intervention, treatment, and response strategies to address the needs of children and youth impacted by VAWA; 2): provide direct services to youth victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and/or sex trafficking; 3): attend and participate in monthly Coordinated Community Response (CRR) team; 4): develop and deliver training to assist law enforcement and other allied professionals, such as prosecutors, courts, health care providers, and the juvenile justice system; and 5): partner with Evelyn K. Davis Center for Working Families ("EKDC") to provide economic advocacy and training for API youth being served. The project addresses OVW priority areas 1, 2, and 3.
- My Sisters' Place, Inc., victim service provider, will implement the project to address CY purpose area 2 by serving children and youth aged 11-24 in Westchester County, NY, AND Bronx County, New York.
 - a. **MOU partners:** The Children's Village, Inc., community-based organization.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) provide comprehensive, age-appropriate, culturally- and linguistically-appropriate, evidence based trauma interventions to teens and young adults, 2) increase the knowledge of youth-serving professionals to support impacted and at-risk youth, 3) help youth, including those at high risk of victimization or perpetration, to develop healthy relationship skills, recognize

abusive behavior, and practice bystander intervention. By partnering with local organizations that support education and job placement for youth, the project addresses OVW priority area 3. By incorporating technology enabled abuse into their prevention curriculum, the project addresses the program-specific priority against online harm and abuse.

- Partnership Against Domestic Violence (PADV) is a victim service provider, will
 implement The First Decade Program to address CY purpose area 1 by serving children
 and youth aged 3-10 as well as their non-abusing parents in the service areas of
 Gwinnett and Fulton County, Georgia.
 - a. **MOU project:** Family Wellness Center a community-based organization.
 - b. This project aims to: 1): provide intervention, counseling, recreation, and supportive services for young children who have been exposed and impacted by the VAWA crimes; 2): provide state-certified training for childcare teachers and training for local law enforcement and allied professionals to identify and assist children exhibiting signs of DV trauma; 3): provide individualized case management and licensed, professional counseling to children and non-abusing parents to address and cope with the effects of abuse and teach positive behavioral responses to emotions; 4): will develop a training curriculum for licensed childcare providers to include new training content on how DV impacts children, how trauma affects their behaviors, and local services and resources; and 5): offer free summer camps for children, providing recreation, educational games, and therapeutic activities.
- Peace Over Violence (POV), a victim service provider, will implement purpose area 2, to
 provide intervention and prevention services to participants in the Para Lost Ninos
 Youth Workforce Services, a program focused on achieving economic justice for
 vulnerable youth and young adults, ages 11 24, living in poverty in Los Angeles.
 - a. **MOU partner:** Para Los Ninos, a community-based organization serving youth.
 - b. **The project aims to:** Create and strengthen the protective factors that support a transition to self-determination and stability for at-risk and vulnerable youth including homeless, runaway, foster care, and those exposed to violence. Peace Over Violence will adapt its Youth Over Violence curriculum to integrate it into

Para Los Ninos Youth Workforce Services with the aim to: 1). prevent and respond to youth and young adult participants in an economic empowerment/workforce development program for highly vulnerable individuals who have experienced homelessness, foster care, exploitation, justice system involvement, and other traumas; 2) Provide training to Para Los Ninos staff, parents and adult caretakers, social services staff and other professionals on the needs of youth who are victims; 3) Develop leadership among youth who will present a comprehensive prevention program for peers; 4) Provide direct services to youth. The project will address OVW priority area 2, economic justice.

- Pokagon Band of Potawatomi (Pokagon Band), a federally recognized Indian Tribe and victim service provider will address purpose area 2, integrating education on violence against women into established programs with a focus on Pokagon boys ages 3 17 through the Strengthening Healthy Masculinity Among Pokagon Boys project, within the 10-county service area of the tribe in southwestern Michigan and northern Indiana.
 - a. **MOU partner:** 36th Circuit Court, friend of the court.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) Integrate age-appropriate programming or Pokagon boys related to violence prevention, healthy masculinity, healthy relationships, and bystander intervention into existing programs for Pokagon children and youth; 2) Tailor programming to include cultural values and teachings around healthy masculinity and honoring women; 3) Collaborate with project partner to develop prevention programming focused on healthy masculinity; 4) Build capacity among the Pokagon Band's CCR team to support the project. This project addresses OVW priority area 1, racial equity and 2, underserved populations.
- Raksha, Inc., is a sexual assault victim service provider, to address CY purpose area 2, serving youth ages 11 –24 in the service area of Atlanta, GA.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Athena's Warehouse, a community-based organization.
 - b. This project aims to: 1): develop a CCR addressing emerging issues and receive training on trauma-informed care, cultural competency, and working with youth impacted by violence; 2): will develop a strategic plan/logic model through community strengths and needs assessment by conducting focus groups with current and former youth programming participants who can provide feedback

and insight on the ground urgent issues, gaps, and barriers to services; 3): serve young adults and develop, expand, and strengthen collective capacity to offer preventative, intervention, treatment, and response services through culturally and linguistically competent counseling/case management services, youth programming, and awareness campaigns; and 4): will develop and deliver educational programming training for criminal justice and other allied professionals addressing the prevention of and response to youth victims impacted by domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, and sex trafficking. The project addresses OVW priority areas 1, 2, & 3.

- Retreat Inc., victim service provider, will implement a project to address CY purpose area 3 by serving children and youth aged 14-18 in the service area of East Hampton, NY.
 - a. **MOU partners:** East Hampton High School, a school, Organización Latino Americana, YMCA East Hampton RECenter, East Hampton Public Library, and I-tri.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) increase local awareness among youth-serving professionals and broader community about teen dating and sexual violence, 2) deliver The Retreat's curricula focused on health relationships to teens, including Latino communities, and 3) increase avenues for local teens to receive treatment and support. By updating their prevention education to incorporate online harm, the project addresses the program-specific priority against online harm and abuse.
- Safe Voices, a victim service agency, will implement the Tri-County Youth Advocacy and Prevention Project to address purpose area 3 and will serve children ages 5 – 19 throughout the service area of Androscoggin, Franklin, and Oxford Counties.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Maine Regional School Unit No. 56 (RSU 56) and Maine School Administrative District 52 (MSAD 52).
 - b. **The project aims to:** 1) Increase safety for children and youth by providing prevention education in schools across the service area 2) Enhance the scope of intervention services and programs for children who have been exposed to or

- impacted by domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, or sex trafficking 3) Improve community response and referral process.
- Sexual Assault Resource Agency (SARA), a victim service provider, will implement the Coaching Boys Into Men and PACC-Men program to address EM purpose areas 1, 2, and 3 in the service area of Charlottesville, VA.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Shelter for Help in Emergency and Charlottesville Alliance for Black Male Achievement.
 - b. This project aims to: 1): increase bystander intervention among men and boys; 2): increase connections and support among men to directly address violence against women and girls; 3): increase knowledge and skills to recognize, understand, label, express, and regulate men's own emotions; 4): implement the program to build partnerships with enrichment organizations to train trainers to deliver Coaching Boys Into Men (CBIM); and 5): recruit and work with community partners through local schools, sports clubs, and men's organizations, providing tools to empower local men in leadership to use their influence to prevent violence against women and girls. The project addresses OVW priority areas 1 and 5.
- Shoshone-Paiute Tribes, a federally recognized Indian Tribe and victim service provider, will implement the project to address purpose area 2 and will serve youth ages 11-24 in the Duck Valley Indian Reservation in Owyhee County, Idaho and Elko County, Nevada – one of the most remote Indian Reservations in the lower 48 states only accessible by a single highway.
 - a. **MOU partner:** Idaho Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence.
 - b. The project aims to: Include youth ages 11 24 impacted by violence in the STOP services currently provided. The project will also undertake prevention activities for this age group. The project addresses OVW priority area 3, underserved in both its status as a federally recognized Tribe and the focus on Native American youth in that Tribe.
- The Tucson Center for Women and Children (DBA Emerge), a victim service provider,
 will implement Expanding the Coordinated Community Response to Prevent

Domestic/Dating Violence Through the Engagement of Men and Boys to address purpose areas 1 and 2 in the service area of Pima County, Arizona, including Tucson.

- a. MOU partners: Boys to Men Tucson, a men and boys focused organization, Goodwill Industries of Southern Arizona, and Tucson Juneteenth Festival Committee.
- b. The project aims to: 1) increase the number of men trained to mentor boys in healthy masculinity and preventing gender-based violence and 2) integrate DV education and a call to prevent violence into existing male-focused programs, including a program for Black youth and men involved in the justice system (HEAT and HEAT for Youth), 3) expand A Call to Action talking circles and events led by Black men, and 4) transform policies that harm Black and Brown youth within the Tucson Unified School District (TUSD) District Alternative Education Program (DAEP), and 5) promote healing and engagement for BIPOC men who have experienced trauma by integrating embodiment practices into services for male survivors. By increasing the accessibility of mentorship programming and education for BIPOC boys from men, including those involved in the justice system, the project addresses OVW priority area 1.
- Turning Pointe Survivor Advocacy Center, a victim service provider, will implement a
 project to address purpose area 2, serving youth ages 11-24 in the rural county of
 Mason, Washington.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Centro de integral Educativo Latino de Olympia (CIELO) a community-based culturally specific organization serving the Latinx communities and South Sound YMCA Shelton Branch, a community-based organization serving youth.
 - b. This project aims to: 1) Provide youth victims with direct services that are developmentally appropriate, trauma-informed, and culturally responsive to address the effects of trauma due to victimization, including support groups, individual support, safety planning and age appropriate advocacy; 2) Improve the community's response to youth victims by convening and participating in the Mason County Coordinated Community Response (MCCCR) Team meeting quarterly to exchange information, engage in cross-training, and collaborate on

improving system response to youth victims; and providing training on effective responses to youth victims for community-based organizations and first responders; 3) Developing and delivering youth-oriented prevention education workshops for youth; supporting peer educators in facilitating bi-monthly youth-led trainings to help peers recognize and support youth who may be victimized; and providing online prevention education through Instagram. This project addresses OVW priority 1, racial equity. The project aims to increase effective response and services to the growing Latinx youth and their families in Mason County.

- Umbrella, Inc., victim service provider, will implement Umbrella Prevention and Response to address CY purpose area 2 by serving children and youth aged 11-18 in the service area of the Northeast Kingdom, VT.
 - a. MOU partners: Northeast Kingdom Community Action and Northeast Kingdom Youth Services, community-based organizations, Caledonia SIU, the Community Restorative Justice Center, Orleans County Restorative Justice Center, St.Johnsbury School, Lake Region Union High School, North Country Union High School, St. Johnsbury Academy, Orleans County Sheriff's Department, Vermont Department of Labor, and Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital.
 - b. The project aims to: 1) maintain and create access to resources for youth survivors that are specifically designed for their unique needs, 2) implement a multi-pronged community wide prevention approach, 3) empower youth to work toward prevention through community leadership initiatives. By partnering with entities such as the VT Department of Labor and establishing the NEK Economic Empowerment to provide wrap-around services to homeless, runaway, foster care, and emancipated youth victims. The project addresses OVW priority area 3.
- Women's Center Shelter, a victim service provider, will implement the Hands Are Not
 For Hurting Program to address CY purpose area 3, serving youth ages 11 –19 in the
 service area of Allegheny County, PA.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Gwen's Girls and Center for Family Excellence Community-Based Organizations.

- b. This project aims to: 1): provide school-based services and educational programming for preventing and responding to domestic violence and dating violence to middle and high school youths, community-based, and culturally-specific partners; 2): develop Coordinated Community Response Team (CCRT) to cross-train and strategize on emerging issues or barriers in youth and young adult's access to supportive services and develop solutions across the communities served; and 3): measure progress in completing project goals and objectives by setting Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) with the proposed school and community-based, culturally-specific partners; WC&S and the partners will participate in quarterly CCRT meetings. The project addresses OVW priority area 1.
- The Wyoming Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Assault (WCADVSA), a
 community-based organization, will address purpose area 1, recruit men and boys as
 mentors and purpose area 2, integrate education on violence against women in existing
 or created programs, with the service area in Laramie, WY.
 - a. **MOU partners:** SAFE Project (victim service provider), and University of Wyoming Multicultural Affairs (UWMA).
 - b. The project aims to: 1) Co-create evidence-based and informed prevention strategies acting across all levels of the social-ecological model (SEM) that will engage mend and boys within a racial equity and LGBTQAI+ supportive framework; 2) Implement the strategic plan within advancing racial equity and supportive improvement with LGBTQAI+ populations; 3) Engage in a continuous learning environment through evaluation project processes and outcomes, with intentional considerations of data extraction from traditionally marginalized communities. This project addresses OVW priority 1, racial equity and 2, underserved populations.
- The Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) of North West Ohio, a victim service provider, will implement the project AMEND Together to address purpose areas 1 and 2 to engage young men and boys as role models and integrate education on violence against women in Toledo, Ohio.

- a. **MOU partners:** Toledo Public Schools ("TPS") and will target school-aged boys ages 12-19 enrolled in a TPS school.
- b. The project aims to: Integrate education on domestic violence, assist them in developing healthy relationships, challenge the social norms that support violence against women and girls, cultivate healthy masculinity, understand the intersections of these crimes with all types of related violence, and change the future for girls and women. The desired outcomes are 1: to build awareness and understanding of the issue of violence against women and girls; 2: identify and challenge harmful attitudes and beliefs that contribute to violence; 3: develop communication and empathy skills to support healthy relationships, and 4: take action to prevent violence against women and girls in their community. This project addresses OVW priority area 5, underserved with a focus on serving African American youth.
- YWCA of Schenectady (DBA YWCA NorthEastern NY), a victim service provider, will
 implement the project to address CY purpose area 2 by serving children and youth aged
 11-19 in the service area of Schenectady, NY.
 - a. **MOU partners:** Boys and Girls Clubs of Schenectady, Young Parents United, and Safe Inc. of Schenectady, community-based organizations, and Schenectady County Department of Probation and the Mohonasen Central High School.
 - b. **The project aims to:** 1) provide mental health counseling and prevention programming to youth, 2) deliver training to allied professionals and youth-serving organizations, 3) develop new partnerships to support their prevention programming, and 4) lead cohorts of YW Strive for Teens. By delivering the economic empowerment curriculum, YW Strive for Teens, the project addresses OVW priority area 3.
